

As I've written in the past, about 60% of your personality comes from your DNA, and 40% from your environment. Well mum got 100% from YiaYia Maria, her mother...

But then again, she was born in the First World War. Then the Depression came. Then the Second World War. Then the Greek Civil War. Then transplanting the family to Australia.

Dad was away SO much. She had to cope with so much stress and strain. And so much loneliness.

I have two photos of both sets of grandparents, leading up to the TV room. So I say "Good Evening" to them, as I walk up the stairs, every night. And as I look into Yiayia's eyes, I remember my mother's words that HER mother, NEVER, ever smiled.... Yes she has that very stern look, with VERY, pursed lips....

Interestingly my Pappou (grandfather) Manoli, has that faraway look, in his eyes, that comes from incipient dementia. The time, when the mind turns inwards, and loses focus of the world around... I wonder, I wonder!

And what is the strongest memory that I have of my mother?

WELL, I was about 10 years old, so it was around 1960. It was about the time when young children, start to pay attention to their parents conversations. So I would listen to "matter of fact" conversations... about the drudgery of menial factory work. Of family conflicts, of what would you like for dinner tomorrow night, when you are eating TONIGHT's meal.

Conversations with little emotion in their voices

It was a time in our house, when it was full of young men, out from Greece, starting their lives in the new, promised land... So, sleeping room was at a premium.. So, for a few years, I slept in the same room as my parents.... One night, I woke up, listening to my parents talking quietly, and LOVINGLY to each other... I had never heard that tone in my mother's voice, before... and it has stayed with me all these years.... A beautiful woman's voice, in love with her husband...

It was a different ERA, back then. A public show of emotion, was frowned upon (unlike now, where a lot of young people are determined to show the

world around them, how much in love, they are!)...

THEY loved each other deeply... but it wasn't for the whole world, to see.

Mum and dad, met on a Wednesday, married on the Saturday, and were back in the tobacco fields of Kamara, on Sunday (YES, the wedding was arranged, but then again, nearly all marriages were arranged, back in 1939. And, would you believe that they stayed happily married for 54 years ... In my early twenties, she would lecture me to marry first, THEN fall in love. Just



like she did. Equally, I was determined, to do it the other way, around ... and then along came Tina...!

Mum was a mother's mother.

In my late teens, and early twenties, when there was just the three of us, in the house, she would come to my room, whilst I was still asleep. She would sit at the edge of my bed, and tell me stories... Tell me, about the dreams that she had had, that night. Tell me about the lottery that we hadn't won, the day before. Tell me stories about her youth, about life's hardships. She would even tell me funny stories, and she would laugh,

and her ill-fitting teeth would clatter.... It was a wonderful way to wake up, every day.

She knew how to keep house, she knew how to look after dad (but never understood his Alpha male character. She always had a knack for disturbing the sleeping lion). And above all, she knew how to fuss over her children... especially me, the youngest .... BUT, every now and again, a darkness would come over her.

When she was a young girl, her teacher at school, told each child in the class, what they would become, when they grew up... Mum got a short straw;

"Elpiniki, when you grow up, you'll become a nun "

In her darkest days, she would always cry out. ... "I should have become a nun, just like my teacher told me "

Whilst dad was alive, she was alive, even with those dark days.

When dad passed away in 1993...she was lost. She moved in, with Maria, and settled down to widowhood. A few years later, she broke her hip, twice. Her ligaments went, and she ended up in bed. Unable to walk. She had to be carried to the bathroom. Her two daughters would give our mother, her weekly bath. She lost her mobility and something more...

Her independence, and her dignity.

(When dad was alive, she would do her housework, and be finished by 9 am. Then she would head for the hills... she would catch a bus, to Central to buy a lottery ticket, then catch another bus, to go to Bondi Junction, to buy a couple of tomatoes, then go to the Spot, to buy a loaf of bread. She was on the move, all day. She needed to be FREE). So, unfortunately, she spent the last four years in bed. Helpless, and TOTALLY dependent on Maria.

Losing her mobility..... made her bitter.

Even with Maria's infinite patience. It, on occasion, drove Maria to distraction to look after her

The record was 15 wake up calls during one night. "I'm cold, I'm hungry, I'm thirsty ..... I'm....I'm...." Occasionally Maria, still feels a sense of guilt, that she didn't do enough for mum. She did much, much more than anybody could have, and would have, done.

Over these years in bed, mum started to waste away. In her younger days, she was the quintessential Greek mother, all hips, and arms, and bosoms. I remember on a hot summer's day, as a young boy, I would put my head on her arm. And it was always COOL!

In her last few years she become gaunt ....I would visit her on Mondays nights, and kneel beside her bed. And it would make me sad, looking at her frail and withered body.

On Thursday 14th December, 2006, Maria called me, to tell me that mum hadn't eaten for a day. So I went to the local Fish shop, and bought a dozen oysters (her favourite food), and took them over to her. She looked bad, very bad. I tried putting an oyster in her mouth, and she chewed and chewed, but didn't swallow. COULDN'T swallow. Swallowing, is learnt response, learnt in the womb... sometimes people forget how to swallow. Mum had forgotten. The next day we took her to the hospital. She fell into a coma. The doctors, said that there was nothing that they could do for her.... Her body was shutting down. So, she went into palliative care.

Maria, Tina, and I were with her.

We would take it in turns to moisten her lips with some water. We talked to her. She would drift in, and out, of consciousness. As the days wore on, she was less and less, conscious. I would hold her hand and talk to her, she would open her eyes, and there was nothing there... her mind had turned inward. Then I would have panic attacks, every time I went to the toilet... WHAT IF, she passed away, whilst I wasn't there....what if...? I had missed saying goodbye to dad, by 10 minutes, and I was determined to not let that happen with mum.

Then I would talk to her, and tell her to turn the lights off, and go and find, dad.

As the days wore on, I would tell her that dad was calling her, she would occasionally open her eyes, whenever I mentioned dad's name.

We slept there, every night to be with her. She had made so many sacrifices in her life, for us. And I wanted to be there, until the end....

But the end, wasn't coming. The week wore on. She had had, NO food, NO water, only her lips moistened.

By Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> December, I had to have

a shower, a shave. I rushed home, in the morning, and I rushed back, afraid to miss, saying goodbye....

BUT how do you help your mother, go, when it's time, to go.... I talked to her about dad.. I told her dad was calling her, then I would tell her, to call dad.

Late on Saturday night, I repeated, and repeated; "Fonaxe to baba (call dad).

At 10pm, she opened her eyes for a brief moment, she opened her mouth to speak. To call out, to dad.

And she went.

She was gone.

I'm sure that that night they found each other, that they are together again, again talking gently, to each other.

She passed away at 10.03 pm on



Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> December 2006.

And, in our lives together, she unknowingly, taught me that the most important, Lesson From Life is ... LOVE.

Theos sihorestine?

Nah, there was nothing to forgive.

I still miss you mum. AND I still remember, ALL your Lessons.



### **DID YOU KNOW?**

IT'S BEEN 77 YEARS SINCE THE INVENTION OF POLYURETHANE?

Otto Bayer, pictured above, (1902–1982) discovered Polyurethane in 1937. He was born in Frankfurt am Main, Germany on November 4, 1902. There he began his study of chemistry, which he concluded in 1924 with a doctorate.


He had an interesting career working for Bayer for many years. (Although he shared the name of his employer he was

related to the founding family of Bayer Corp.) At 32 Otto Bayer was transferred to Bayer in Leverkusen where he was made head of a Central Scientific Laboratory.

His greatest achievement was ultimately the invention of polyurethane chemistry. The team of inventors involved in inventing Polyurethane headed by Otto Bayer were: Werner Siefken, Heinrich Rinke, L... Orthner and H... Schild.

The work of Otto Bayer and his team means that today polyurethanes are

ubiquitous throughout modern life.


"Mon Dieu, NO... French Cheese should ONLY be eaten with GOOD bread ... preferably a baguette"
